

Bio

John Steffler

- Served as Canada's 3rd <u>Parliamentary Poet Laureate</u> from 2006-2008.
- His five books of poetry include That Night We Were Ravenous, which won the 1999 Atlantic Poetry Prize.
- His novel, The Afterlife of George Cartwright, won the 1993 Smithbooks/Books in Canada First Novel Award, the Thomas Head Raddall Award and was shortlisted for the Governor General's Award and the Commonwealth Prize for Best First Book.
- Although born in Ontario, Steffler adopted Newfoundland and Labrador as his home for over 30 years ago.
- His writings about Newfoundland reflect a most Canadian occupation with discovery and exploration.
- His classic of Canadian wilderness writing, The Grey Islands, describes a sojourn on an isolated island off the coast of Newfoundland.



Before viewing That Night We Were Ravenous:

- Have you ever seen or experienced something strange when you were driving at night, or when you were outside in the dark?
 - For example, something familiar in daylight suddenly looks totally different at night, like the tree outside your bedroom window turns into a strange creature.
 - How would you describe it?

After viewing That Night We Were Ravenous:

- Who was 'she'? What do you think she might represent?
- Name at least two of the metaphors that Steffler used to describe the strangeness of this creature.
- Compare Steffler's presentation with the presentations of the slam poets.
- How is his presentation different?
- What are the advantages and disadvantages of reading from the page?







Activities 1

- HERE is a link to the text of <u>That Night We Were</u> <u>Ravenous</u>.
- DRAW a picture of one or more of the images that Steffler used to describe the moose. Don't draw the animal itself, but the image he creates, e.g., 'a beaver trying out stilts.'
- PICK an animal and describe it using metaphors and similes.
- COMPARE it to unexpected things, as Steffler did, such as: comparing a moose to a beaver trying out stilts; eyes like Halley's comet; insubstantial as smoke.





Activities 2

John Steffler

- USE the metaphors and similes from his poem as a model to draw out your own. Follow his poem, noting the following:
 - How does the animal make you feel? ("She made us feel blessed.")
 - What does the animal remind you of? ('She reminded us she was an ocean wearing a fur suit.')
 - What does this animal know nothing about? ('She knew nothing of corners or doorways.')
 - What does the animal remember? ('She could remember a glacier where she was standing.')
 - What does the animal do? ('She pulled our zippers down.')
 - What would happen if you touched the animal? ('If we had touched her, she would have burst through our windshield in a wall of blood.')



Before viewing My Latest Invention:

- What device would you like to invent or have someone invent?
- What would it do?
- Have you ever invented something? Describe your invention.
